Learning Discipline at Sea: A Story from Experience

One particular experience onboard reinforced the importance of small actions leading to bigger results.


We were preparing for a complex loading operation in Indonesia, and the situation demanded absolute precision. Cargo loading, especially for bulk carriers, is not just about putting weight on board—it's about carefully distributing it to ensure stability, compliance, and safe passage.



During a loading operation in Indonesia, I discovered that the shore operator had exceeded the weight limit. While cross-checking the loading sequence, I noticed that they had skipped one of the planned sequences, leading to incorrect weight distribution. If left unchecked, this could have compromised the vessel's trim and stability, resulting in operational delays and potential safety risks.

Instead of proceeding with the incorrect sequence, my team and I halted operations, recalculated the cargo distribution, and reloaded the cargo to match the planned sequence. It was a time-consuming process, but this extra step ensured that the vessel remained balanced, compliant, and safe for voyage.

By the time loading was completed, everything was in perfect alignment. The vessel sailed smoothly, inspections were cleared without issues, and I walked



away knowing that paying attention to the details had prevented a serious operational setback.

This incident reinforced my belief that cross-checking even the smallest details can prevent major operational risks. The discipline of verifying every process, no matter how routine, is what ensures smooth and safe sailing.

Why I Chose Campbell: The Power of Stability

In 2023, I made the decision to join Campbell Shipping, and it has been one of the best career moves I've made. I remember discussing the difference between management companies and ownership companies with Captain Nixon, and that conversation shifted my perspective.

At a management company, officers often find themselves struggling for resources and approvals, creating unnecessary stress. But at Campbell, the structured support system allows officers to focus on their job without operational roadblocks. If I present a valid request, I know the company will back me up.

Having this level of trust and assurance makes a huge difference in how a ship operates. At Campbell, I feel like I'm part of a team that truly values integrity, discipline, and teamwork—values that define not only great seafarers but also great leaders.

Discipline at Sea: The Power of Small Actions

The "Make Your Bed" philosophy is something I live by, and it's not just about tidying up—it's about starting the day with discipline. Onboard, every small habit matters.



That's why I ensure my team follows the same principle—mastering the fundamentals, focusing on the details, and staying disciplined. This is what separates a smooth, efficient operation from one that struggles with errors and setbacks.

Leading by Example: Fostering a Strong Crew Culture

Leadership at sea isn't about giving orders—it's about building trust, fostering engagement, and ensuring every crew member feels valued. I always take time to interact with my crew, ask about their well-being, and make sure they know their efforts are appreciated.





I strongly support Campbell's 'Green Badge' program, which recognizes crew members for their exceptional contributions. Recognition doesn't have to be grand—even a simple "well done" can boost morale and encourage accountability.

Additionally, I have introduced an interactive learning approach onboard. Instead of just conducting one-way training, I encourage crew members to actively participate and even lead discussions on key topics. When seafarers take ownership of their own learning, they become more engaged, more confident, and more skilled.



Advice to Young Seafarers: The Reality of Life at Sea

I see many young seafarers drawn to this industry because of social media. While it may look glamorous, the reality is far more demanding. Shipping requires mental strength, patience, and discipline.

My advice to those entering the industry is simple:



A Journey of Growth at Campbell Shipping

I joined Campbell Shipping because of its strong reputation for safety, innovation, and seafarer development. The company's focus on training, career progression, and operational excellence aligned with my personal aspirations.

I started in an entry-level role in operations, where I learned the fundamentals of cargo handling, compliance, and ship coordination. Over time, I progressed to the rank of 2nd Officer, taking on more responsibilities like navigational safety, risk assessment, and decision-making alongside senior officers and the Master.



One of the most fulfilling aspects of my time at Campbell has been witnessing its adaptation to new technologies and sustainability initiatives. The company continuously improves its systems, making operations safer, more efficient, and environmentally conscious. Being part of a company that values progress and professionalism gives me immense pride.

Responsibilities at Sea: The Backbone of Safe Navigation

As a 2nd Officer, my primary responsibility is safe and efficient navigation. This involves:

- **Watchkeeping & Collision Prevention:** Ensuring the ship stays on its intended course, avoiding hazards, and preventing accidents.
- Electronic Chart Display & Information
 System (ECDIS) Management: Keeping navigational charts updated and accurate.
- **Weather Monitoring:** Analyzing forecasts and adjusting course or speed to ensure safety.
- **Safety Drills & Emergency Response:** Conducting routine training for the crew to prepare for fire, medical, and evacuation scenarios.
- **Medical Officer Duties:** Being the first responder to any medical emergencies onboard.
- Mooring & Unmooring Operations: Safely securing and releasing the vessel at ports.

Beyond these technical duties, my role also involves risk assessment, effective communication with the bridge team, and maintaining meticulous documentation—all of which contribute to seamless operations at sea.

Overcoming Challenges: A Lesson in Preparedness



The sea does not forgive mistakes, and every officer learns this early. I have faced many navigational challenges, including rough weather, equipment failures, and restricted waters.

One of the most challenging situations I encountered was navigating a narrow strait during a

severe storm. Reduced visibility, high winds, and heavy maritime traffic created a dangerous scenario. Instead of pressing forward blindly, I gathered my team, assessed the risks, and coordinated with the nearest coastal station and Master to find a safe anchorage.

During moments like these, training and discipline take over. The decisions we make in high-pressure situations determine the safety of the crew, vessel, and cargo. This incident reinforced my belief that good leadership isn't just about giving orders—it's about listening, assessing, and making informed decisions under stress.



The 'Make Your Bed' Mindset at Sea

The "Make Your Bed" philosophy is simple: small daily habits build the foundation for greater success. This applies directly to life onboard a vessel.

- Completing small tasks like organizing logs, inspecting safety gear, and doublechecking equipment ensures larger operations run smoothly.
- A single unchecked navigational error can cause a deviation, potentially endangering the ship. By treating every step with precision, we prevent bigger problems.
- Encouraging the crew to take pride in their work, whether it's cleaning their cabins or conducting safety checks, fosters accountability and unity.

I have found that maintaining structured habits, leading by example, and focusing on small wins daily is the key to success and efficiency at sea.



A Small Oversight Caught in Time: My Reflection on a Near Miss

One habit that has helped me immensely is pre-watch checks. Before every shift, I systematically review all bridge equipment, radar, weather updates, and charts.

One time, during my routine pre-watch briefing, I discovered a malfunction in the ECDIS system. Since I had developed the habit of checking systems before taking over, I was able to detect the issue before it escalated into a navigational risk. This early detection allowed us to switch to backup systems, follow manual plotting methods, and avoid a potential hazard during transit.

This experience reaffirmed my belief that small, consistent actions lead to bigger achievements—not just in personal growth, but in operational safety as well.

A vessel functions like a well-oiled machine, and every crew member is a crucial cog. Ensuring that the team remains motivated and disciplined requires effort.

- **Clear Communication** Making sure everyone understands their roles and how they contribute to the bigger picture.
- **Encouraging Ownership** Giving team members the confidence to take charge of their tasks instead of just following orders.
- **Recognition & Appreciation –** A simple acknowledgment can boost morale and reinforce good practices.
- **Team Building & Support** Creating an environment where crew members look out for each other.

By maintaining open communication, structured feedback, and a culture of mutual respect, I ensure that my team stays engaged and proactive.



One of my proudest career moments was when I led a navigation safety initiative during a voyage through a high-risk, narrow passage. Due to operational constraints, we had to navigate without pilotage. Understanding the risks, I took the initiative to:

- Conduct in-depth risk assessments and route planning.
- Train the bridge team on manual navigation and contingency measures.
- Maintain constant communication with the Master and shore-based support.

Despite reduced visibility and high traffic density, our preparedness ensured a smooth passage without incidents. This experience reinforced my belief in the power of preparation, teamwork, and strong leadership.


Final Thoughts: Leadership, Discipline, and the Future

At Campbell Shipping, I've found a company that values integrity, professional growth,










Meals That Keep the Crew Going Strong

Hariyali Malai Chicken

Ingredients

2 chopped onions
Tomato puree 100gm
Spinach 100gm
3-4 Mint leaves
10-12 Cashew Nut
2 tablespoon cooking oil
Salt taste wise
1 tbsp ginger garlic paste

Recipe by -Mr. Shoyeb Malik [Chief Cook]



Spices

1 tablespoon garam masala 2-4 green chillies

Procedure:

- Put oil in a pan heat it, then put onion and ginger garlic paste and stir fry it.
- Add tomato puree, stir it for 20-30 secs.
- Add chicken and fry it for 10-15 minutes.
- After that add spinach puree mint leaves and cashew paste to stir it for 2-3 minutes on low flame.
- Your dish is ready, put it on the serving plate.
- Garnish it with some white sauce and bell peppers, and it is ready to eat.





Makhana Kheer

Ingredients

- Makhana/ Fox nut (1 med size bowl)
- Dark brown Dates (10-12)
- Ghee (3-4 teaspoon)
- Cardamom powder (1/4 tsp)
- Chopped Almonds (4-5)
- Chopped Pistachio (4-5)
- Milk (500 ml)





Recipe by -

Procedure:

- Soak dark brown dates in ¼ cup of warm water for 10-15 minutes. De-seed them and blend them into a smooth paste.
- Heat 2 teaspoons of ghee in a pan and add the makhana.
- Roast the makhana/ fox nuts on a low flame until they turn golden brown and crispy, then transfer it to a bowl.
- In the same pan, add 2 teaspoons of ghee and roast chopped almonds and pistachios.
- Take a heavy bottom pan or kadhai and boil the milk on low flame until it reduces to half the volume.
- Add roasted makhana/ fox nut and boil it for 5 minutes.
- Then add the date paste to the milk, stirring well.
- Later, add the cardamom powder and roasted dry fruits.
- Let it simmer on low flame, allowing the flavors to blend beautifully.
- Your healthy and yummy makhana kheer is ready.
- Serve warm or refrigerate for a few hours and enjoy it chilled.




